#### INA-15, 2015

In the year 2015, INA and the Neurobehavioral Teratology Society (NBTS) will have a joint meeting in Montréal, Canada from June 28 to July 3, 2015. As is customary, NBTS will meet with the Teratology Society (TS) and Organization of Teratology Information Services (OTIS) at the same location. Montréal is a culturally rich city on the St. Laurence River in Quebec, Canada with diverse attractions of art, architecture, music, cuisine and nature including the Montréal Botanical Gardens, Beaux Arts Museé, Montréal Historic Old City St. Joseph's Oratory, Mount Royal Park and a wide variety of outstanding international cuisine. The theme of the meeting will be "Neural Mechanisms of Functional Impairment Across the Lifespan." Proposals for symposia will be solicited by the program committee as the meeting time approaches.

The Neurobehavioral Teratology Society has been active for over 35 years. Its purpose is to understand the behavioral and neural alterations that result from genetic and environmental perturbations of the nervous system. There are approximately 170 members with several key dual members including former officers of both INA and NBTS. The two societies have overlapping and complementary interests in neurotoxicology. In addition to research concerning environmental toxicants, NBTS scientists also conduct research into the neurotoxic effects of drugs of abuse and therapeutic drugs. Research covered by NBTS includes the persisting effects of developmental exposure, but particularly since the inclusion of the Behavioral Toxicology Society, research at the NBTS meeting also includes neurotoxic effects of chemical exposures throughout the lifespan.

## Of Interest

INA-NTS Neurotoxicity Symposium in Barcelona, July 13th, 2012

The Symposium "Mechanisms of Neurotoxicity and Implications for Neurological Disorders" was held at the Bellvitge Institute for Biomedical Research (IDIBELL), Hospitalet de Llobregat, Spain, on July 13th, 2012, as a Satellite Event of the 8th FENS Forum of Neuroscience held in Barcelona. We were pleased to organize this symposium as a joint activity of the INA and the Neurotoxicity Society (NTS). The event included 9 invited presentations as well as oral and poster communications. It attracted 86 registered

participants, of which 35 were students. Besides INA and NTS, other sponsors provided funds or organization help. We thank the Bellvitge Institute for Biomedical Research (IDIBELL), University of Barcelona, Karolinska Institute, Society of Toxicology (SOT), International Brain Research Organization (IBRO), Spanish Ministry of Economy and Competitiveness, and the Journal of Internal Medicine. Selected talks from the Symposium will be published as review articles in a forthcoming issue of this journal. The symposium highlighted the common areas of scientific interests and established a friendly atmosphere between INA and NTS members. After this first joint activity, we are persuaded of the interest of an increased collaboration between these two societies.

# **Business Meeting Minutes**

Minutes INA business meeting at SOT (March 12, 2012)

Proceedings are being finalized (hopefully finished mid April) and will be published in *Neurotoxicology*. Though there have been some delays in the reviews process, currently, 16 out of 13 session summaries are accepted. From the >40 full length research articles, 12 are accepted, 6 in revision, 6 under (re)review.

## 4.- Membership Report – Jordi for Sandra

After the Xi'an meeting we got 10 new members. Currently, INA has 260 members (244 full members and 26 student members) from 34 countries.

## 5.- Treasurer's report – Jordi for Jan

There is a decline in the amount of money in the INA-account. This is mainly due to the fact that the seed money from the Xi'an meeting has not been returned. The seed money from INA-12 in Israel has been returned.

#### 6.- Website report – Eugenio

The website update is an ongoing process and input from members is needed to improve the content.

In addition to neurotoxicology.org, INA has now also claimed neurotoxicology.net to improve the visibility of INA. Obtaining the neurotoxicology.net domain was previously approved by the executive committee. During the business meeting the plans for web maintenance of neurotoxicology.net has been approved after voting.

## 8.- Update on plans for INA-14 in The Netherlands, June 2013 – Remco
