#### President's Message

#### **Dear INA Members:**

It has been a busy year for many of us in planning the upcoming INA-12 meeting at the Ma'ale Hachamisha Kibbutz Hotel and Conference Center in the Judean Hills, Israel June 7-12, 2009. Yoram Finkelstein is head of the local planning committee and he has been very active in making all the arrangements to assure the meeting will be a success. Yoram has also arranged an exciting program of tours of the many interesting historical sites in the region. Don Fox leads the Scientific Program Committee that has developed a stimulating program around the theme of Gene-Environment Interactions in Neurotoxicology. I have organized a Financial Planning Committee to try and raise funds to help support the meeting. The latter has been particularly difficult, as you might imagine, given the general state of the economy. Nevertheless we do have several donors already and we hope to line up more in the coming months. Thanks to Yoram's planning and negotiations, we expect the meeting will be financially sound. Shortly, we will open the website for registration and submission of abstracts (if it is not opened already). Please register soon in order to take advantage of the lower rates for early registrants.

In addition to planning for INA-12 in Israel in 2009, we are also looking forward to INA-13 in China in 2011. The meeting will be in the historic city of Xi'an, home to the famous terracotta army, among other attractions. For 2011, we have agreed to hold a joint meeting with the International Symposium on Neurobehavioral Methods and Effects in Environmental and Occupational Health (NEUREOH), organized under the International Committee on Occupational Health (ICOH). The joint meeting will provide INA members with numerous opportunities for cross-fertilization with neurobehavioral and epidemiological researchers. Wei Zheng (USA) will chair the International Organizing Committee working with Jingyuan (Julian) Chen (China) as the vice-chair for that meeting. The planning committee will also have vice-chairs from INA and ICOH reflecting the two societies. Miki Aschner, Wei Zheng and I met with officers and members of the NEUREOH last summer in San Jose, Costa Rica and discussed the proposal of a joint meeting of the societies at their business meeting. We were impressed with their enthusiasm for holding a joint meeting with INA. Planning for the meeting is currently beginning.

Other upcoming events include the INA general business meeting at the annual Society of Toxicology meeting in Baltimore this March. The site and time of the meeting will be listed in the SOT program. Also, we will soon be electing the next set of INA officers so please look for ballots to be delivered to you by E-mail and send in your votes. Finally, we need to consider possible venues for the INA-14 meeting in 2013. Please consider offering to host the 2013 meeting and submit a proposal for consideration at the business meeting in Israel.

#### INA-12 – Jerusalem, Israel

The 12<sup>th</sup> meeting of the INA will convene June 7-12, 2009 at the Ma'ale Hachamisha Kibbutz Hotel and Conference Center, in the Judean Hills corridor on the outskirts of Jerusalem. Israel's unique atmosphere of a modern vibrant society living alongside the architecture, museums and sites of 3000 years of history since the time of King David, guarantees to provide an unforgettable experience. The Ma'ale Hachamisha venue contains modern rooms and a new convention center. All rooms have a view of the surrounding Judean mountains and both the rooms and conference facilities are air-conditioned. The hotel complex also includes a spa, swimming pool, and other amenities.

The recent Israeli incursion into Gaza is expected to be a limited military operation, with respect to time and location. Israeli troops are in Gaza proper and the area within Israel directly affected by the rocket launching is limited to 25 miles from the border. Jerusalem is located approximately 70 miles from Gaza. The 12th INA meeting is scheduled in a Kibbutz that is fairly isolated in a mountainous area. In general, daily life in Jerusalem and most other parts of Israel has not been affected by either the rockets or subsequent military actions. For example, there have been recent visits of Arab academicians in Jerusalem and joint Palestinian-Israeli participation in Al Quds University. As a general rule, personal safety in Israeli cities is parallel to Europe and the US.

The general schedule of events is attached to this newsletter. Expect to see the call for abstracts and registration soon, and start making plans to meet in June in Israel!

#### INA-13 – Xian, China

The International Conference on Toxicology of Neuronal Diseases, jointly hosted by the 13th International Neurotoxicology Association (INA13) and the 12th International Congress on Occupational Health – Neurotoxicology and Psychophysiology (ICOH-NP12), will take place between May 29-June 3, 2011 in Xian, China. The Conference will focus on the environmental and occupational causes of human brain disorders, the molecular mechanisms underlying these disorders, and translational approaches that assist the clinical diagnosis, facilitate the global prevention, cure and alleviate these disorders. The Conference invites interested researchers all over the world to join the meeting, share innovative ideas, seek potential collaboration, and advance our understanding of the toxicology of neuronal diseases.

The conference venue Xian is a historic and cultural city in China. From the 11th century BC onwards, Xian served as the Capital city by 13 dynasties successively. The Museum of the first Emperor of China, Qin emperor, and his terra-cotta warriors and horses are called the 8<sup>th</sup> marvelous spectacle in the world. In addition to the culture tour organized by the Local Organization Committee, the Conference will provide a Chinese culture-scented banquet, organize the traditional soccer games, possibly among the teams from Africa, Asia, Europe, and North/South America, and make available the post-meeting China tour.

Dr. Wei Zheng, a professor at Purdue University in the U.S., will chair the International Organization Committee to coordinate this exciting event. Dr. Zheng visited the meeting venue with Dr. Michael Aschner in 2007, had the organizing meeting with local organizers Dr. Julian Chen and Dr. Yuxin Zheng in Sept 2008, and most recently had the meeting with Dr. Will Boyes in Research Triangle Park, in order to solve the logistics and pave the way for a successful international conference.
